

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Message from the Curator

This winter was devastating to the trees of the county. Everywhere you looked there were limbs of pine



trees on the ground and in some areas whole trees uprooted. Even though there was a massive amount of material after the snow melted I doubt if many people thought of making something creative from the wood. In our collection at the Museum there are three pieces of wooden ware, two pitchers and a tray made from a tree in the Ellicott graveyard on Old Columbia Pike. According to the records, they were designed around 1926 by a man named George Horseshoe who lived on Fels Avenue off Main St. in Ellicott City. Mrs. Frank Higginbothom, Sr., wife of one of the undertakers in town, purchased these for \$5.00 and they were later inherited by her daughter-in-law, Cora Hig-

ginbothom who lived on Hill St. All three items are hand-carved, the tray having delicate leaves on the top rim and tiny feet on the underside. One of the pitchers still has the branch nubs protruding from the sides just as the tree looked when it stood. The mystery of Mr. Horseshoe's life remains to be discovered. Connie Scholl, one of our Research Library Volunteers is searching the Census Records and we are checking Cemetery lists as well. Any other information would be most welcomed.

The artifacts are currently on display in a case in the Museum along with other items from the collection such as a metal meat tender-See Curator, continued on page 5

Oakdale on Tour Saturday, May 1

The Warfield family of Howard County and their homes is the focus of a day-long luxury motorcoach tour for Howard County Historical Society members on Saturday, May 1. Seating is limited to only one bus and a box lunch will be provided. Five houses, now all private residences, will be visited and there will be several drive-bys of other historic places important in Warfield family history. Departure for HCHS members will be at 9:30 a.m. from the Court House parking lot behind the museum and library, returning there about 4:30 p.m.

Among the sites being visited on the tour are Solopha, originally the home of Charles Alexander Warfield Sr., with its oldest section dating to 1718 and its main section being a Gothic Revival work from 1889. Next on the tour will be Raincliffe, dating from 1856 and once the home of Charles Alexander Warfield Jr. and his son Wade Hampton De Vries Warfield. Other homes to be visited include Longwood, with its still-standing slave quarters, and the former home of Gustavus Warfield, M.D., veteran of the war of 1812. Cherry Grove, regarded as the family

seat and the burial ground for many Warfields including a former Governor, remains in the family and is a beautiful farm in a most magnificent setting. Finally, Oakdale, which served as the country house of Gov-




Oakdale, long the home of former Governor Edwin Warfield who was born and died there., is one of the tour stops on May 1.

HCHS looks to the future with bold new logo



izer, a lace-making pillow including the bobbins which hold the thread, a few local glass bottles, an early lighting device called a betty lamp which could be hung from a wooden beam, and shoe making equipment.

Recently, we were able to rescue a few things before the Clarksville Middle School was torn down. A metal and laminated school desk and chair, one of the original blackboards, U.S. Flag, a speaker for the P.A. system, the Cafeteria sign and some relics left behind by an Explorer Troop are now part of our ever-growing collection of items that help document everyday life in Howard County. Come in on Tuesdays and Saturdays from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m to see these and other artifacts from the thousands of pieces we have in our collection.
